The George Washington University's Elliott School of International Affairs is one of the world's leading schools of international affairs and the largest school of international affairs in the United States. Located in the heart of Washington, DC, its mission is to educate the next generation of international leaders, conduct research that advances understanding of important global issues, and engage the policy community in the United States and around the world. In the January/February 2015 issue of Foreign Policy, the Elliott School's undergraduate and master's programs were ranked among the top ten international affairs programs in the United States by the Teaching, Research, and International Policy (TRIP) survey.

The Elliott School, named in honor of former GW President Lloyd H. Elliott and his wife Evelyn, offers innovative, interdisciplinary teaching programs that provide students with the education and training they will need to succeed in the international arena. More than 700 students take advantage of one of the Elliott School's 12 graduate programs. The school offers Master of Arts programs in global communication, international affairs, international development, international economic policy, international science and technology policy, and international security policy, as well as Asia, Europe and Eurasia, Latin America, and the Middle East. The Elliott School also offers a master's degree for mid-career professionals and a dual-degree master of international studies in conjunction with its 19 international partner universities. More than 2,100 undergraduates pursue a well-rounded liberal arts curriculum with a special focus on international affairs or with a regional focus on Asia, the Middle East, or Latin America and the Hemisphere. The Elliott School's 16,000 alumni can be found in leadership positions in the public, private, and non-profit sectors around the world.
